A Letter from the Mayor

February 2024

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

What's Happening Around Town in 60 Seconds or Less.

I am committed to keeping you informed on important issues impacting our Community throughout the year.

For those of you not in attendance at our Tuesday, January 16, 2024, Council Meeting, I am proud to announce the Council approved a new three-year contract with our Police Chief, Richard McEachin. I am extremely happy with the negotiations and grateful for the excellent service our Police Chief and his staff provide to the Clayton Community.

Also at this meeting, we discussed a potential parking permit program near the planned 81-unit Olivia on Marsh Creek Project downtown. Thank you to those citizens who made their voices heard. We hear you loud and clear.

Rather than presenting options and encouraging discussion on how to solve the problem, the Staff Report seemed designed to push towards the desired result of taking no action and "kicking the can down the road." I, too, was disappointed with the Staff Report and the direction they wanted to take. A "kick-the-can down-the-road" approach is unacceptable and our community deserves better.

The Council gave direction to Staff to return with an agenda item to establish an ad-hoc committee to discuss potential solutions or actions that we could take regarding the impact excessive parking may create in Stranahan, downtown, and surrounding areas. I think we can all agree that 81 units with just 1.1 parking spaces per unit is a problem waiting to happen. Additionally, to clear up any misunderstanding, the Olivia on Marsh Creek is not a 55 and over Senior Housing Project and there is no age restriction.

As I mentioned in my last writing, I am extremely excited to participate in the planning for Clayton's 60th Anniversary of its 1964 Inauguration. I encourage everyone to get involved. Please contact City Hall if you would like to volunteer your time or expertise.

As your mayor, I will work hard to maintain Clayton's character while running an open and transparent local government. I want to keep you informed and involved in important decisions every step of the way.

Lastly, Happy 100th Birthday to Clayton resident Chuck Kohler. As one of the few remaining World War II and Pearl Harbor survivors, we



thank him for his service and honor his sacrifices for our country.

In November of 2020, Contra Costa County residents passed a countywide 20-year, ½ cent sales tax, Measure X. This tax is dedicated to "keep Contra Costa's regional hospital open and staffed; fund community health centers, emergency response; support crucial safety-net services; invest in early childhood services; protect vulnerable populations; and for other essential county services."

The County began collecting the tax on April 1, 2021. As of September of 2023, \$298.5 million in revenue has been collected in total.

Measure X has allowed the Board of Supervisors (the Board) to develop, expand, and maintain a greater equity of services and outcomes for all residents while addressing some of the gaps and disparities in our County's healthcare, social services, housing, and public safety.

Measure X funds have been used to fund several crucial programs and projects including the A3 (Anyone, Anywhere, Anytime) Crisis Response, adding 3,000 square feet to Psychiatric Emergency Services at Contra Costa Regional Medical Center, funding the County's newest department – the Office of Racial Equity and Social Justice, developing a family navigator program, creating a Housing Trust Fund, and expanding fire services in east Contra Costa County.

These funds are typically allocated

Measure X

through the County's budgeting process. However, this fall, there were funds unallocated: over \$33 million in one-time funds and \$4.7 million in ongoing revenue.

The Board received status reports on previous allocations, new department proposals, and recommendations from the Measure X Community Advisory Board.

On December 12, the Board approved a total of \$4,493,000 in one-time funds to be allocated. \$50,000 for the Clerk-Recorder/Elections' Mapping Prejudice Project, which will identify, map, and redact illegal, restrictive local covenants related to race.

Other funded projects are the development of a third youth center, expanding services in east Contra Costa County, and developing the African American Holistic Wellness Hub.

I proposed and my colleagues supported \$750,000 over three years to Contra Costa Animal Services to develop a spay and neuter clinic/pet retention program. After hearing from many advocates, this funding will improve the welfare of animals across the County.

The Board also approved the allocation of \$4,700,000 in ongoing funds. \$400,000 for the Clerk-Recorder/ Elections' Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) in Democracy Initiative which will add two bilingual DEI specialist positions to increase voter education, engagement,

and turnout. \$1,100,000 for a San Ramon Valley Fire Training Facility. The rest of the ongoing funds were allocated based on issues which include mental health services, food insecurity, and building new parks in the unincorporated County to ensure all residents have equitable access to open space.

Refugee Resettlement Resources

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American Dream TV to Feature Luna Restaurant, Concord

On the cover of this edition is a shot of the American Dream TV show being taped inside Luna Restaurant of Concord.

The "American Dream" is a national TV show with an EMMY nominated production team. The local edition is hosted by real estate professionals within the Bay Area, and more specifically, for central Contra Costa County, Deborah Zacharatos of Keller Williams and Brian Reeg of CMG Mortgage. 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What Will The 2024 Real Estate Market Look Like?

From last year to this year, average home prices in Concord are up 1.6%. In Clayton, they rose four percent. This is not the double digits we saw in years past, but it is not a drop either.

The interest rates, of course, drive prices, and as they become lower, home prices are likely to increase as buyers come back into the market and bid. In that respect, the prognosis for 2024 seems favorable.

The predictions are that the Feds will drop rates again in March; however, even if they don't, we are in a better position than last year. Last October the high rate was 8.03%, and as of January 4, it dropped to 6.70%. So, the pressure is down at this point.

If the rates hit 5.99% as they did in February 2023, well, you would want your home to be on the market for sale. It would be enticing to buyers who would be anxious to lock up that home before rates pop up again. Perception is everything. Rates going up from 5.5% to 5.99% do not cause a stir but going down from a high of 8.03% to 5.99% is a whole different


At 5.99% or below — that will be the big month for sales and price increases due to the bidding that is likely to occur for the few homes available to buy. We are still at an all-time low for homes on the market Some homeowners have 3% interest rates and sitting pat. Do you blame them?

There are a few clients that purchased this year, hoping to lock in a good home price, (buy the home, date the rate) who are also waiting for the rates to drop for a refinance. The refinance market keeps the lenders in business too. My preferred lender sends reminders out to those clients when the rates get below a certain number, to give them the opportunity before things change again. This is a very valuable service.

In fact, if that is your situation, the best thing to do is contact your lender, get your application in with updated documents, and update them monthly. Then when the rate goes down, you won't miss that rate lock and can refinance.

As in prior years, this year's event is a benefit for the TSBA Arts Foundation, which helps fund the summer music program in Todos Santos Park, benefit for the TSBA




Arts Foundation, which helps fund the Concord Family Fourth of July Parade and summer music program in Todos Santos Park.

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Warming Syrah

Syrah is one of those dense red wines that warms you by just looking at it. A robust wine, Syrah has black fruit flavors of berry and dried plum as well as notes of tobacco and dark soil. Also, Syrah is most often aged in toasted oak barrels which impart the flavor of smokey bacon. Here is a meal that pairs each course with a different version of Syrah wine.

New World Syrah from California, Oregon, and Washington tends to be more fruit-forward and lower in acid than French Syrah.

Potato Leek Soup with Sausage Lardon is a great starter on a chilly winter night. This soup is rich and creamy and accented with pork flavors; it is perfect for Syrah. The fat balances the high alcohol and pork flavors are echoed in the wine.

In the Old World (read: Europe), Syrah is celebrated in southern France. The most elegant Syrah wines come from the Northern Rhone and have fine-grained tannins. Slightly more rustic versions are found in the Southern Rhone and the vast Languedoc-Roussillon.

I have chosen Alton Brown's Pot Roast recipe to pair with a French Syrah as the main course. I like Alton's recipe because it uses balsamic vinegar (to balance the higher acid found in French wines), cocktail olives (which have a briny, earthy characteristic) and raisins (to echo the dark fruit in the wine). Add your favorite starch to catch the juices and something green to make your mother happy. You now have a complete plate.

End the meal with a touch of sweetness. Head back to the states where Syrah is often made into a delicious port-style wine. The deep flavors of the Syrah grape intensify as the grapes hang on the vine. The high alcohol content of the wine is muted by the sweetness that remains when fermentation is stopped early.

The classic pairing with port-style wines is Stilton; however, if you prefer milder cheese, try Aged Gruyere. The tiny, crunchy crystals in Gruyere are a nice contrast to the silky texture of the wine. And the fruit in the wine is intensified by the sharp, nutty flavors in the cheese.

So, go on. Pair Up!

Alton Brown's Pot Roast

INGREDIENTS

- 1 (2-pound) blade cut chuck roast
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons cumin

Vegetable oil

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 5 to 6 cloves garlic, smashed
- 1 cup tomato juice



1/3 cup balsamic vinegar

1 cup cocktail olives, drained and broken

1/2 cup dark raisins

Preheat the oven to 200°. Place a wide, heavy skillet over high heat for 2 minutes.

Meanwhile, rub both sides of meat with the salt and cumin. Brown meat on both sides and remove from pan. Add just enough vegetable oil to cover the bottom of the pan then add the onion and garlic. Stir constantly until onion is softened.

Add the tomato juice, vinegar, olives, and raisins. Bring to a boil and reduce the liquid by half. Create a pouch with wide, heavy duty aluminum foil. Place half the reduced liquid/solid mixture on the foil, add the roast, and then top with the remaining mixture.

Close the pouch and wrap tightly in another complete layer of foil. Cook for 3 to 3 1/2 hours until very tender. Puree the cooking liquids and solids into a sauce to serve alongside if desired.

Yield: 6-8 servings

INGREDIENTS

- 1 large or 2 small leeks, about 1
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 strips bacon, chopped
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 5 cups chicken stock
- 1 to 1 1/4 pounds russet potatoes, diced
- 11/2 teaspoons salt
- 3/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup crème fraîche or heavy

Trim the green portions of the leek. Using a sharp knife, halve the white part of the leek lengthwise and rinse well under cold running water to rid the leek of any sand. Slice thinly crosswise and set aside.

In a large soup pot over medium heat, melt the butter and add the

bacon. Cook for 5 to 6 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the bacon is very soft and has rendered most of its fat. Add the chopped leeks and cook until wilted, about 5 minutes. Add the wine and bring to a boil. Add the bay leaves, chicken stock, potatoes, salt and white pepper and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and cook for 30 minutes, or until the potatoes are falling apart and the soup is very flavorful.

Remove the bay leaves and puree the soup with an immersion blender. Stir in the crème fraîche, thyme and adjust the seasoning. Top with sausage lardon.

What's eating my apples? Who's munching on my lettuce? What's that white stuff all over my rose leaves? Your garden is full of crimes that are waiting to be solved. Are you ready to play Crime Scene Investigator? Dust off your magnifying glass and whip out your smartphone. Let's figure out who done it!

What's attacking my apples (plums, grapes, berries, etc.)?

Not only humans love the taste of sugar, and fruits are naturally loaded with fructose, a healthy and easily digested sugar.

Prime Suspects: Rodents, larger mammals, birds. If your fruit is chewed at night, rodents such as roof or Norway rats and mice are the most likely suspects. If damage occurs during daylight hours, tree or ground squirrels are the criminals. If fruit disappears completely at night, larger mammals such as deer or coyotes can be the culprits. And if your fruit is destroyed by a bunch of smaller holes, birds have been pecking.

Apprehending the Criminal: Live or kill traps are most effective against rodents, but for larger mammals, get out your night vision game camera and "capture" the suspects in the act. No poisons, please.

Preventing future attacks: Net your trees, vines, or bushes with bird netting to minimize damage, install 7-foot-tall deer fencing around your trees and bushes, and vary your rodent trap baits every few days to renew their interest. You can rotate through peanut butter, almonds, walnuts, peanuts in shell, fruit slices, and succulent leaves.

What's chomping my lettuces (tomatoes, squashes, broccoli,

etc.)?

Creatures cannot distinguish between naturally occurring food sources and your backyard vegetables.

Prime Suspects: Rodents, snails/ slugs, larger mammals, caterpillars. Smaller, incomplete damage often closer to the ground indicates snails/slugs, or mice and voles.

If chewing is roundish and smooth, it's likely snails and slugs. Small rodents will leave tooth or scrape marks. Mice and voles are good climbers and can get to higher-up tomatoes also. If damage is more complete, with just nubs left, or the plant completely pulled out, then deer or rabbits can be the culprits. If only leaves are chewed without touching the fruit, tomato hornworm caterpillars, earwigs, or other worms are suspected

Apprehending the Criminal:

Tomato hornworms and other caterpillars/worms can be picked off and dispatched but wear gloves. Small snap traps are effective with small rodents. Modern snail/slug bait is effective and also breaks down into a natural fertilizer over time. Only fencing or exclusion will work for larger mammals.

Preventing future attacks:

Excluding pests from your veggie beds is best. So, install your fencing, raise the beds off the ground, set traps, apply snail/slug bait, and build hoop houses with netting. Note that for all-natural caterpillar, worm, and earwig control, welcome birds into your garden.

What's that white (or sticky) stuff on my roses (clematis vines, or other ornamentals)?

Mealy bugs, scales, spittle bugs, aphids, and molds or mildews can all produce white or sticky stuff on leaves or stems while they suck or smother the life

out of your beautiful bloomers.

Prime Suspects: Fungi grow almost exclusively on leaves, with white upper sides or white, black (black spot), or orange (rust) on lower sides of leaves. Leaves will often be wilted or misshapen. If you find foamy or bubbly white collections on leaves or stems, there are probably mealy bugs or spittle bugs inside the camouflaging foam.

Scales are bumpy and brown/black and line the plant stems. Mealy bugs, spittle bugs, scales and aphids all produce sticky clear honeydew which can turn leaves black when it collects dust. The presence of ants, which love honeydew, is also indicative that you have an infestation.

Apprehending the Criminal: Resist the temptation to spray toxic fungicides or insecticides. Warmer, drier weather is often all it takes for fungi and sucking bugs to dry up or be

eaten by beneficial creatures. Aphids can be sprayed off leaves and stems with a water jet. Insecticidal soap is effective for severe insect infestations and is less toxic to beneficial garden creatures such as ladybugs and birds.

Preventing future attacks: Planting your ornamentals in the right place with the right growing conditions is the longterm solution to fungal or insect damage. Read planting directions carefully or ask garden center staff for advice. Sun, water, soil PH? A happy ornamental plant will be pest tolerant.

Seasonal Note: Prepare your growing beds now for planting next month by mixing your home-grown compost or a slow acting balanced fertilizer into the soil to replenish it with nutrients lost during last year's growing

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What Do You Want, the **Chicken or Egg?**

Recently, there have been multiple outbreaks of avian flu in commercial poultry farms in Sonoma and Marin Counties, resulting in higher-thannormal costs of eggs in grocery stores. So, is it worthwhile to raise chickens to offset the costs of eggs?

There are great benefits to raising chickens. Besides the obvious one of providing a steady supply of tastier fresh eggs that are that are usually more nutritious, chickens have personalities, provide a fun source of entertainment, and do not require

There are also a variety of chickens that can produce a diversity of egg sizes, speckling, and colors. For example, if you want blue eggs, you should consider either Ameraucanas, Araucanas, and Cream Legbars. Raising chickens also promotes a sustainable lifestyle by recycling vegetable scraps and because their manure can be composted into a rich garden soil.

Tove Danovich, author of "Under the Influence, Backyard Chickens and the People Who Love Them" describes some considerations before acquiring a backyard chicken. First, if only the eggs are the main point to raising, chickens stop laying when they molt, but they still consume a lot of food. This is why many industrial egg-laying facilities will cull their hens before they reach two years, despite the chicken's typical lifespan of seven or eight years. But if you like the idea of a unique pet the hens have a more idea of a unique pet, the hens have a more humane life.

There are economic downsides to raising chickens. Commercial chicken feed can be pricey, not to mention the startup costs of building a chicken coop. The birds can be messy and smelly. It is also possible that they may attract pests such as mites and internal parasites like worms. There are other health concerns for the birds that might arise, such as egg-bound hens (rare in well-cared for hens) or prolapsed vents. Also, in addition to lags in egg-laying because of molting, hens typically stop producing eggs in the height of summer and depths



of winter yet the costs of feeding the hens

If you are fed up with the high cost of eggs due to avian flu outbreaks or are excited to raise chickens as pets, research any ordinances in your neighborhood. Most urban areas do not allow roosters. There may be other residential restrictions, such as the proximity of coops to other residents and how many hens are allowed.

So now that you know more about raising chickens, do you want the chicken or the egg? If you only want to avoid buying expensive eggs, it might make more sense to pay grocery store prices and hope the avian flu outbreak is soon contained.

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
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
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Hillside has Opened, Hot Dog!

City Staff Recommends Expansion of School Buffer Zone, Other Changes in Cannabis Regulations

Responding to rising public concerns about teen marijuana use, city staff proposes expanding the minimum buffer zone between



cannabis dispensaries in the city and schools, daycares and youth centers.

The proposal is among of suite of proposed modifications to the city's cannabis ordinance, including security standards.

The staff report proposed modifications to the ordinance to include the expanded school buffer zone (which would match the standard currently in Contra Costa County's ordinance for unincorporated areas), as well as a security provision requested by the Martinez Unified School District.

The updated proposal would add a new buffer requirement of 1,000 feet from parks, playgrounds, colleges, universities and libraries, as well as expand the current 600-foot buffer from schools (kindergarten through grade 12), daycares and youth centers to 1,000 feet.

As to the reason for the new proposed buffer, the staff report reads:

The recommended changes to the buffer requirements are due in part to feedback from Craig Lazzeretti, the Martinez Unified School District, and the Public Health Institute.

Contra Costa County's health officer, Dr. Ori Tzvieli expressed his support for efforts to shield youths from marijuana exposure, noting the impact it has on the developing brains and connection with anxiety and mental health issues, which have emerged as a major nationwide topic of concern for youths in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Tzvieli noted that "all of our surveys" are showing greater use of cannabis products by youths, including 28% of 11th graders reporting marijuana use.

The staff report states that the

city's two existing dispensaries, Embarc on Alhambra Avenue and Velvet on Sunrise Drive, currently comply with the proposed 1,000-foot buffer. But borders the Martinez Adult Education campus.

In a press release issued by the school district at the time, Cammack wrote:

Although students won't directly access the products of the dispensary due to strict industry regulations, there are concerns about having any business on a shared property border that requires extensive security provisions and multiple security guards.

Additionally, the current location may limit the potential uses of the Martinez Adult School property. In prior years, the Adult School housed a preschool, and more recently overflow parking for Alhambra High School, both of which the district could not operate in good conscience if a cannabis dispensary is opened on this shared property border.

The city is also suggesting the council reconsider the ordinance requirement for 24/7 on-site security at the dispensaries. Despite the requirement being clearly spelled out in the current ordinance passed by the council 2019, it wasn't enforced until after the fatal August officer-involved shooting of a 20-year-old burglary suspect, Tahmon Wilson, at Velvet, where no security guards were present.

The staff report notes that a survey conducted by the city's cannabis consulting firm found that only three other Bay Area jurisdictions with retail cannabis dispensaries currently require 24/7 on-site security (Fairfield, Suisun City and Vacaville).

The updated proposals in the staff report still fall short of what was requested by the Public Health Institute, which lobbies for responsible local cannabis policies designed to protect youths.

The festival kicked off with a brilliant opening day ceremony of dancing, flag waiving, speeches and other

performances. Each pilot was blessed with a red dot on the forehead as they entered the kite field Each country were assigned a station in a colorful 10 by 10 easy-up in line with all other countries. Members of the international teams would stop by just to shake his hand and grab a selfie with the "guy from Martinez."

"I felt like I'm some kind of a superstar," Jetland said. The hospitality and the overwhelming outpouring of acceptance and love by the Indian people is like nothing I've ever experienced."

One of the kites Jetland brought was one he custommade for the event that stated "Kiteman of Martinez" printed on it which he flew in the main arena among all the other

international kite pilots.

He gave a brief speech to the generals and admirals and dignitaries introducing

himself as the Kiteman of Martinez representing Martinez, California from the United States of America.

The sky was littered with the brilliant colors of hundreds of kites for the duration of the festival. The Festival involved traveling by bus to two other cities and flying then returning to Ahmedabad for the traditional Indian kite fighting competition.

People stand on flat rooftops in bare feet, running around, trying to cut people's kites out of the sky with what they call a manja line, which is a string line with crushed glass glued into it.

The idea is to wrap your kite line around somebody else's kite line from three blocks away and cut their kite out of the sky. This continues until the last kite flying wins.

Tony failed at this miserably at this. "I had about 10 kites cut up." These are kites purchased from street vendors especially for the competition. "You buy

a stack of ten or fifteen of them and a few thousand feet of line."

Jetland muses that the entire trip cost him twenty-three dollars and seventy-five cents. That was for his Bart ticket to and from Lafayette to San Francisco. "They took care of us amazingly with hotel accommodations and food and whatever we needed.'

As per the country itself he says, "You realize how lucky we are where we live. The infrastructure, water, store, road conditions, living conditions, it really humbles you to realize how people live in other parts of the world. I came home to Martinez with the refrigerator full of food, while these people are going meal to meal.

Who knew when Diablo Gazette first named Tony Jetland the "Kiteman of Martinez" in 2017 that it would lead to such international notoriety. Thanks for representing us, Tony.

Food traditions are important to the overall festivities of the Lunar New Year. It is customary to eat jioazi, (dumplings) at midnight as a symbol of wealth and prosperity in the New Year.

The seventh day of the festivities is reserved especially for farmers and is also considered the birthday of mankind. People generally eat noodles on this day to ensure a long life.

Tangerines and oranges are a big part of the celebration and represent happiness and abundance. These are displayed in the home and given as hostess gifts. Giving tangerines whose stems and leaves are intact represents

lasting friendship. Giving a whole tree in a pot to display at your front door is even better.

Candied fruit is displayed in homes as a "Tray of Togetherness" and promises a sweet New Year. After enjoying several pieces of candy the adults place red envelopes called lai see in the center of the tray. The lai see contain money and signify luck. Each of the candied fruits has meaning. For example kumquats are for prosperity.

Other Traditional New Year

Eight Treasures Rice, which is a mixture of rice, fruits and nuts.

Won Ton Soup.

Song Gao, a cake that is made from rice that is ground loosely.

Jiu Niang Tang, sweet wine-rice soup which contains small rice balls.

Mustard greens, often eaten on one of the last days of the celebration to cleanse the body.

Long Noodles, to ensure along life. Chicken, pork, and spring rolls are also important.

It's not just food that is significant during the Lunar New Year. Flowers play a meaningful role as well. Plum tree buds are bought the day before the New Year and are hoped to blossom on New Year's Day. Chrysanthemums

symbolize longevity while narcissus represents

> prosperity and sunflowers mean "have a good year."

Bringing family and friends together on the New Year is also an important aspect of celebration. They help to clear out the bad energy and bring in the good. So gather everyone around you and celebrate good luck and prosperity this year with lucky foods and sweet treats.

Candied Sour Citrus Peels



 $4\ large\ oranges,\ 3\ grapefruit,\ 6$ lemons or limes, halved through stem ends

3 cups sugar, divided

8 to 10 tablespoons lemon juice

Tear out flesh from orange halves, careful not to create holes in peels. It is okay if you can't remove all of the pith. Save flesh for another use; cut peels into 1/4 inch strips.

Bring orange peels and 4 cups water to a boil in a large saucepan and cook 5 minutes. Drain and return peels to pan. Repeat process twice more, using fresh water each time. Return peels to pan; add 2 cups sugar and 2 cups water. Bring to a boil and cook until peels are soft, translucent, and vibrant looking, 30–40 minutes (about 10 minutes longer for grapefruit, or 10 minutes less for lemons or limes).

Drain and transfer peels to a wire rack set inside a rimmed baking sheet; chill until cool, about 15 minutes. Whisk lemon juice and remaining 1 cup sugar in a medium bowl. Add peels: toss to coat. Return to rack; let sit at room temperature 1 hour. Toss peels again in sugar mixture. Return to rack; let sit 4–12 hours to dry out.

Citrus peels can be candied one month ahead. Store airtight at room temperature.



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A New Type of New Year's Resolution: What Matters Most

If you are like most people, by February you have already left your New Year's resolutions behind. But if you still want to make 2024 a great year, consider a different approach. Traditional resolutions tend to focus on what you should (or should not) be doing. You tried daily exercising in January, but unless you really care deeply about exercise,

the odds are you were not able to sustain it.

A new kind of resolution could be to focus on what is most rewarding to you and do more of that. Once you discover something that really gives you joy, you will want to do it and keep doing it.

Making a positive, impactful change requires understanding what will truly motivate and fulfill you, and a willingness to set up your life to achieve it. It takes asking yourself what matters most to you, being honest with your answers, and digging deep to learn why.

Ask Yourself Key Questions

When you ask yourself, "What matters most to me?" and "What would make the biggest difference in my life this year?" rather than giving a generic answer like good health, get specific. This could be sleeping throughout the night or climbing stairs with ease and confidence. Getting specific with what matters most will help you understand what truly motivates and fulfills you.

Next ask yourself, "How will having what matters most impact my life?" Determine why this is important to you. For example, why is sleeping through the night important? Is it to have energy throughout the day to enjoy with your friends or family? Is it to improve your mood? Will a solid night's sleep help you run errands or do household chores? Is walking up a flight of stairs important so you can visit your grandchildren? What are the rewards that you care about deeply?

One approach is to discover what

If building a strong social circle is what's most important to you, implementing that theme will help you organize your life to create a strong social circle. This strategy will inspire you to do what's necessary, like making phone calls,

responding to text messages, attending that book club, inviting a friend to coffee, or going to the neighborhood BBQ.

Another strategy is to address the Five W's: this will involve scheduling activities and restructuring your time to be consistently successful.

What am I going to focus on?

Why is it important to me?

Who can do it with me or support me?

Where can I do it?

When will I do it?


You may also be motivated by writing out your results as if you have already achieved them. Examples: I easily walk and climb stairs with confidence. My friends and I laugh and appreciate each other as we share stories over brunch. Vision boards are also great if you are inspired by photos and other visual cues.

There are many strategies and approaches to fulfilling goals. However, the best strategy is to combine what matters most with what is most rewarding to you. As humans, we naturally want to do what makes us feel good.

Impacting Health & Well-Being

One of the most important things I offer my patients is to help them determine what matters most. Then we work together to make it happen. If visiting their grandchildren would give them the most joy but they cannot climb the stairs to their house, we set up specific exercises to build that strength. Once they experience that joyful connection, their lives improve. They are happier. They have more energy.

Starting with what matters most is essential to improving anyone's satisfaction, happiness and quality of life. It impacts our health and well-being in every way. I am confident that with this approach, you will thank yourself next year for it.





Embrace Your Inner Tarzan

This is a 3-dimensional world. Human beings are designed to live a physical life. We are supposed to get regular doses of multi-planar movement, including eye movements. Being an integral part of a complex environment stimulates movements that are imperative for optimal health and performance.

Many of us are living extremely 2-dimensional lives right now. Not only are we staring at screens for hours on end, but we are also physically sheltered. We do not need to be on high alert about the world around us — nearly everything we need is right in front of us. We literally do not have to reach very far for anything.

This convenience comes at a hefty cost to our health and well-being that goes far beyond your body mass index.

"Wonka" is not a remake of the 1971 classic, "Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory." This is an origin story and what sets the film apart from most origin stories is that it is based on Gene Wilder's character in the original film, as opposed to the character in the original book.

It has long been known that the 1971 film deviated from Roald Dahl's book, "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory." will find themselves seeking answers that link the plot to the original film. Questions about Oompa Loompas and Slugworth may surface and could be resolved in a possible sequel. Also, those familiar with the first film know that Willy Wonka faced some challenges that viewers were never privy to. Those missing gaps of time would be interesting to explore in another film.

There are new songs, but none of them are quite as catchy as the tunes in the first film. At times, young Willy hums "Pure Imagination" and even sings some new lyrics, but I found the original song stuck in my head for days after. This film can also be perceived the same way as it respects what came before it and does not try to compete or replace it. What an enjoyable way to introduce young fans to the classic film without telling them they need to have this new interpretation instead.

Please Don't Destroy: The Treasure of Foggy Mountain

This time of year, audiences are flooded with so called "important films." Studios like to save their serious films till the end of the year so they will be fresh in the minds of voters for various awards. Although they offer limited runs in New York and Los Angeles to be eligible, the general public usually does not get to see these films until January or February of the new year.

Maybe you have been watching heavy, intense films with running times close to three hours. If you are looking for a palette cleanser, something completely offbeat with the sole purpose of entertaining you for an hour and thirty-two minutes, look no further than "Please Don't Destroy: The Treasure of Foggy Mountain."

If you are a current viewer of Saturday Night Live, you are already familiar with this comedy trio. Do not worry though, there is no prerequisite necessary to enjoy this silly and sometimes sweet film.

Ben (Ben Marshall), Martin (Martin Herlihy) and John (John Higgins) are three childhood friends and current roommates who have delayed growing up. They all work at Trout World, a large outdoor store owned by Ben's father who is hilariously played by Conan O'Brien. Ben would like to run the store one day but does little to prove he would be qualified for such an undertaking. Martin wants to make a serious commitment to his girlfriend, Amy (Nikole Sakur), which makes him realize he needs to be more responsible. As John watches his two best friends embrace adulthood, he fears he will lose them forever and longs for a way for the three to reconnect.

Shortly thereafter, John stumbles onto a social media post about the treasure of Foggy Mountain and decides seeking the



treasure is the perfect way to bring his friends back together. Ben and Martin think the treasure will impress their dad and girlfriend, respectively. So, they go all in on John's plan. Throw in two female park rangers who are hot on their trail, and adventure, romance and lots of laughs ensue.

The film leans toward the absurd and this type of foul-mouthed humor may not be for everyone. But beneath the jokes is a nice message about finding your purpose in the world and how the relationships we establish as children can be a challenge to maintain as we mature.

"Migrations" (Flatiron Books, 2022, paperback, 272 pages, \$13.70) by Charlotte McConaghy is the story of Franny Stone who lives in a dystopian future where most of the world's birds have become extinct. She risks it all to follow what she believes will be the last migration of Arctic terns across the ocean from Greenland to Antarctica. She convinces Ennis Malone, the captain of a fishing boat named the Saghani, to take her on as a crew member. Malone believes that the terns will reveal the location of fish, a commodity that is also on the cusp of extinction.

Franny is a deeply damaged character with a surprising history — a dark past that is about to catch up with her. Franny is very unpredictable, can be violent, and she is also a sleepwalker, which can be a dangerous condition on a fishing boat.

Two sides of Franny are revealed throughout the novel. Her motivations to follow the terns are juxtaposed against her turbulent Irish childhood

where she grew up without a mother. McConaghy's talent at creating compelling characters goes beyond Franny. In addition to the quirky members of the fishing boats, readers get to know Franny's husband, Niall. He is as compulsive as she is and extremely tolerant of Franny's idiosyncrasies. Niall is a professor who first encounters Franny during an ornithology lecture he is teaching. When she bolts from his classroom, he seeks her out. He eventually discovers Franny works as a janitor at the college and isn't a student. Niall falls hard for her, and they impulsively get married. Their bond is truly unique and special, because at their core, they care deeply about birds.

"Migrations" was an Instant National Bestseller, an Amazon Editor's Pick Best Book of the Year in Fiction. a TIME Magazine Best Book of the Year, and the #1 IndieNext Pick for August 2020. Fans of Barbara Kingsolver will enjoy McConaghy's novels. Her books are bound to





White Pony Express Announces Move To Concord by Maggie Fusek, Patch Staff

The Contra Costa nonprofit White Pony Express, has been at its Pleasant Hill site since 2015 but needs a larger facility to serve more people.

White Pony Express, a Contra Costa County-based nonprofit organization that aims to eliminate hunger by recovering fresh, healthy food and delivering it to those in need, has just announced its plans to move to a larger facility.

Since 2015, the organization has been headquartered on Vincent Road in Pleasant Hill but will soon relocate to 2470 Bates Road in Concord. White Pony Express plans to make the move in the first quarter of the year to meet a growing need for its services, according to spokesperson Steve Spraitzar.

Through its Food Rescue Program which operates seven days a week, White Pony Express recovers the equivalent of 8,500 meals each day from over 70 local food outlets. Within 24 hours, volunteers redistribute the nutritious food to nonprofit partners who in turn feed the most vulnerable people in Contra Costa County. [Read more on Patch.

Area Students Win Congressional App Challenge for Developing Tools that **Support Health and Wellness**

Congressman Mark DeSaulnier (CA-10) announced that Sania Bidurukontam of San Ramon is the winner of the 2023 Congressional App Challenge (CAC) for California's 10th Congressional District.

Bidurukontam invented the CogniPro app, which aims to reduce misdiagnoses of attention-deficit/ hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and help mental health professionals properly diagnose ADHD. The app includes a 2D platform game and embedded eye tracking to monitor levels of hyperactivity, impulsivity, and inattention, the most common symptoms of ADHD.

Three students from Dougherty Valley High School placed second place in a four-way tie with Advita Goyal, Aryan Agrawal, Prisha Marpu, and a team of students from Dublin High School. The students were recognized for their SkinScan, WellTeen, Med Track, and Politica AI apps, respectively. SkinScan helps identify and monitor skin conditions, WellTeen helps manage stress and promote mental well-being, and Med Track helps users track their daily medications.



Third place was awarded to Jacob Trentini from Monte Vista High School for his app BreatheFree, which monitors air quality and pollen levels.

"It's such a joy to see students' creativity and talent on display each year during our Congressional App Challenge," said Congressman Mark DeSaulnier in a press release.

The winners were chosen by a panel of judges from the STEM and education fields, all of whom live or work in California's 10th Congressional District. The Congressional App Challenge is a public initiative encouraging young people to learn how to code to inspire creativity and promote interest in STEM education. In the eight years of the CAC, the program has yielded 46,928 applicants across all 50 states.
